Celebrating our Learning

Reception

What a fantastic week of learning the children in Reception have had. We started the week by learning why many people around the world celebrate Ramadan and enjoyed lots of fun activities to support our learning. It was wonderful to see and listen to the knowledge and confidence from some of our children, who were happy to share their experiences of celebrating Ramadan with their families. In phonics we have been learning new sounds 'ai' and 'ee' and showed so much enjoyment with the activities set up to help us, especially working as a team to create a Cannon Park train! It has been amazing to take so much of our learning outside this week because of the beautiful weather. Also to support our phonics, we used chalk and paint to create beautiful rainbows, and we collaged bees to hang in our trees! Our topic this week has been 'Animals' and the children have loved finding out about different zoo animals. We went on a hunt with our clipboards to see how many different animals we could find and used our phonics and writing skills to name them all. We even spotted the new digraphs we had learnt this week! It was also fun to take some of our animals outside and create shadow drawings, and we spoke about why and how shadows appear. The children really enjoyed this activity and were very proud of their drawings. In maths, we have been subitising with numbers up to 10. The children are beginning to visualise groups of numbers quickly, rather than needing to count them now, which is amazing! E.g. Rather than counting 8, they can see 5 and 3, or 4 & 4. The children have also enjoyed celebrating World Book Day this week and had lots of fun reading with their Year 6 buddies.

At home, we would like your child to have a go at writing a sentence about each picture in their book. Remember to use the sounds we have learnt this week – 'ai' and 'ee'.

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Year 1

In English, we planned and wrote our character descriptions for the character of NOA from *The Last Zookeeper*. Before we wrote our final draft, we had a go at editing and improving our writing for the very first time. We had to check our spellings and letter formation; we had to make sure that we remembered our finger spaces, capital letters and full stops, and make sure we had included lots of exciting adjectives. Miss Delargy and I are very impressed by the quality of writing Year 1 have produced - it's amazing! In maths, we have been developing our knowledge of fact families by solving number problems up to 20. We have been using our number bond skills and learning how to use the inverse to find missing numbers and check our answers. This is a new skill that we need to practise so any help at home would really help e.g., 9 + 5 = 14 so 14 - 5 = 9. In science, we ended our topic with an outdoor lesson. We went on an animal and creature hunt to find out what animals live in our school grounds. We saw different types of birds like magpies, pigeons and even two buzzards! We also saw a ladybird and a worm, and we found some leaves that looked like they had been munched by a hungry caterpillar... One of our highlights was finding a dog toy, which we found out had been stolen from a neighbouring house by a fox!



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This was extra funny because it was a toy fox! Another highlight was stumbling across some mole hills. We wondered how deep they went and how far across the field they travelled. Mr Higgs told us about other animals he has seen around the school, which included a muntjac deer, a river otter, parakeets, a great spotted woodpecker and a green woodpecker, a heron and a robin. Mrs Smith also said she had seen a muntjac deer so we will be keeping our eyes peeled for a future sighting. In geography, we also finished our topic with an outdoor lesson. Firstly, we recapped our knowledge of weather symbols and then had a go at predicting a weather forecast for Coventry. Then, we went outside to perform our weather forecasts with a lovely sunny backdrop. We had to make sure that we remembered all of the important vocabulary; it was lots of fun. In RE, we explored Abrahamic Worldviews. We learned that Christian, Muslim and Jewish worldviews share some things in common. They all started in the Middle East, they all believe in one God and their holy texts share similar stories, for example, this week we looked at Noah's Ark as told in the (Christian) Bible and the (Jewish) Torah, and next week we will look at The Ark of Nuh as told in the Qur'an. Finally, Thursday was World Book Day. Everybody looked so fantastic in their pyjamas, and we had lots of fun doing a variety of book themed activities. We were very excited for the Scholastic Schools online event Picture book adventures and story time with Laura Baker. We got to meet author Laura Baker, and she read us her new book The Full Stop that Got Away. We all enjoyed the book; it was very funny. Have a lovely weekend and we'll see you next week. Year 2

It has been another wonderful, hardworking week of learning in Year 2. The highlight of this week at school has been World Book Day. It was lovely to see all the children in their pyjamas. The children had the opportunity to share their favourite books with Year 5. It was lovely to see the children showing great teamwork and seeing the enjoyment within the children whilst they read their favourite books. We had a great day and especially enjoyed the live webinar visit from Laura Baker. She spoke about her book 'The full stop that got away' and we had the chance to watch her draw one of the characters from the book. In English, we have continued to look at the book 'The Last Zookeeper'. The children have been describing a range of different settings and characters from the story with a focus on using 2A sentences, adverbs and conjunctions. Mrs Akthar and I have been blown away by the children's writing this week and it was amazing to see how well the children's writing has developed since September. In maths, we have finished our last few lessons on multiplication and division whereby we looked at dividing by 5 and looked at how the x5 and x10 table are similar to each other.

As scientists this week we started our new big question: *How could you be the next sporting superstar?* The children have been learning about what humans need in order to survive. We explored that like animals, humans need water, food, air and shelter to explore. As geographers, they have been finding out about the location of the world's desert. We learnt that a desert is any place that gets less than 25cm of rainfall a year. Also, we looked at different plants and animals that can be found in desert. In computing, we looked at notes and tempo.



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We spoke about how a piece of music is made up of a sequence of different notes played throughout a piece of music.

Then we had the chance to create our own patterns using three notes on Song Maker via Chrome Music Lab. After we made our patterns, we listened to it and decided whether we needed to change it. Next, we explored tempo, how quick or slow a piece of music is played. We then decided to have a go at altering our tempo for our music. When we were happy with our finished piece of music, we shared this with our learning partner. On Friday, we were visited by Mrs Brooks (Rory's mum) for Careers Week. She spoke to the children and showed us some photos about her job in Environmental Health. The children were intrigued and really enjoyed asking her questions about her role and the skills needed to perform her job. Thank you very much Mrs Brooks.

Next week, we will be moving on to measuring height and length in Maths so it would be really helpful if your child could have a go at measuring and drawing straight lines with a ruler to the nearest centimetre.

Year 3

This week, our school value of 'enjoyment' has shone in Year 3. We started the week with a visit from Kennedy from Skint2Mint who taught us about the history and value of money. Using different everyday objects, we thought of reasons why Kennedy should trade his money with us. During our English lesson, we read 'Stone Age Boy' by Satoshi Kitamura which tells the story of boy who ends up in the prehistoric period. Our lessons have focused on the skills of writing character and setting descriptions and we are excited to write our own Stone Age stories next week. During our maths lessons, we have been learning about non-unit fractions and how we can order and compare them. In our learning of understanding 'the whole' in fractions, we used part-whole models and a chocolate cake! We all enjoyed the tasty treat at the end of the lesson. As it has been National Careers Week, we have been learning all about entrepreneurship in Year 3. On Wednesday, we were lucky to have Mr and Mrs Napitupulu, from WMG Warwick University, in class to deliver a workshop all about how we can start a business with an idea or solution to a problem. In teams, we identified problems with everyday products, created our prototypes using lego and play dough. Then, we pitched our ideas to the rest of the class.

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On Thursday, we loved celebrating World Book Day in our pyjamas! We enjoyed a live lesson which featured Pamela Butchart, the author of Diary of a Future Billionaire. She gave us some wonderful glimpses into her new book and talked about her exciting journey to become an author. We ended the day sharing books and reading with children from Year 1. Finally, we have been busy rehearsing for our play. All the children have been given their parts so please could you practise their lines with them at home. What a busy and exciting week it has been! Year 4

This week, it has been Coventry Primary Aspirations week. On Thursday, we had an interesting discussion in class about what university is, whether the children would like to go to university in the future and what they would like to study there. In RE, the class learnt about what Muslims believe about God and in computing, the children found out how to tell the difference between real and fake images. 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Year 5

During Thursday afternoon, Year 5 took their science lesson outside. We went down to the woodland area and sat around a campfire!
