What a wonderful week of learning we have had in Reception! This week the children have been learning the 't' and 'p' sounds in phonics. To support their understanding of the new sounds, we created tigers and penguins in the creative area. We had fun getting messy painting the letter P with pegs, pom poms and pink paint. Our favourite activity this week was mixing potions using coloured water, glitter and lots of flowers! In maths we have been learning some important vocabulary, such as more than, less than, heavier, lighter and the same. Year 1

This week has been all about exciting writing, comparing numbers and a visit from the Big Bad Wolf. In English, we explored character traits and feelings to help define the troll's personality. We had lots of practice using adjectives to come up with great ideas we could use in our character descriptions. We also learned about similes and had a go at using them to describe the troll for example, his skin is as green as grass and his voice is as loud as thunder. On Thursday, we wrote our character descriptions, and they are full of exciting adjectives and even some similes! In maths, we have been exploring the language less than, greater than and equal to to compare numbers. We have done an amazing job with understanding the language and beginning to use it ourselves. Any support at home with this will greatly benefit us as we continue to use these skills next week in school. In science, we did an experiment where we built a house in our table groups, each using a different material. We used our scientific enquiry skill of Fair Testing to test them against the Big Bad Wolf! (Miss Brett's hairdryer. We had so much fun, and we learnt that paper is not the most stable material to use. In geography, we explored what a settlement is and the three different types: village, town and city. We looked at different pictures and sorted them into the correct group. We also thought and discussed which type of settlement we currently live in and would like to live in. Year 2

It has been another wonderful and hardworking week in Year 2 with lots of fantastic learning taking place. In Maths, for our final few lessons on place value, the children looked at counting in both forwards and backwards. It would be beneficial for the children to continue practising counting in their 2's, 5's and 10's forward and backwards to support them with their learning when we come to our topic of multiplication and division later on in the spring term. For the second half of the week, we started a new unit on addition and subtraction. We have been working on number bonds to 10 & 100 and using these known facts to link to other related facts. It was great to see the children's confidence grow with knowing their number bonds. In English, the children have been developing their writing skills in our phase two lessons ready to write their own fantasy story based on the book 'George and the Dragon'. This week, they have practised using conjunctions to extend their sentences focusing on subordinating conjunctions when, if and because. Also we looked at the use of adjectives particularly the use of two adjectives together creating a 2A sentence to add descriptive detail. The children then combined these skills to write about their character focusing on either George or the dragon. In science, the children have learnt about the different plants and animals that live in polar, rainforest, desert and ocean habitats. It was lovely see enjoyment from the children when researching the different habitats found on Earth. As historians, we have continued looking at what happened during the Great fire of London. The children learnt that, because Samuel Pepys wrote a diary, we can find out what happened during the fire. In their computing lesson, the children learnt about benefits of IT. We spoke about the role of computers within a supermarket. The children had the chance to role play the different roles such as customer, scanner, item finder, price finder and adder. After having a go, the children discovered that the computer within the supermarket makes it much quicker than having to individually find each item like they did in the lesson. We also spoke about IT having many benefits such as saving human time and making it easier to keep records. In RE, this week we learnt about the incarnation and why it is important to those with Christian worldviews. We learnt that this is when God became human and we looked at the bible story of the nativity.

Another brilliant week Year 2. Well done to you all Year 2 and enjoy your weekend.

Year 3

What another busy week of learning we have had in Year 3. During our English lessons, we have learned how to write an introduction for a non-chronological report and practised how to build paragraphs. As writers, we began our non-chronological reports about animals from the savannah which include many interesting facts. Did you know the ostrich is the largest living dinosaur? As mathematicians, we started the week counting in 50s. We recognised the relationship with the 5 times table and took our learning outside to play a '50s Run and Build' game to see who could build the correct number track. We also started our new topic of 'Addition & Subtraction' and learned how to add and subtract ones, tens and hundreds using 3-digit numbers without exchanges.

During our science lesson, we discovered the functions of our skeleton. To help us understand what a hand would feel like without bones, we used a plastic glove filled with water! We had fun creating a mnemonic dance routine to help us remember the three main functions of a skeleton and created a poster. In our RE lesson, we learned about the Jewish festival of Passover and the role nature and seasons play in Jewish worldviews. During our PE lesson, we learned how to throw a javelin and worked in teams to practise our throw and measure the distance. Well done, Year 3. Have a relaxing weekend. Year 4

Year 4 have really impressed us with their fantastic writing this week. They have written a recount about Queen Boudicca and her rebellion against the Romans. The children have been shown how to use paragraphs in their writing; fronted adverbials to start their sentences; and expanded noun phrases to add more descriptive detail. As well as that, we have also been encouraging them to develop and use a neat, joined-up handwriting style. As mathematicians, we have started a new unit on addition and subtraction. To start with the children have learnt how to use the column method of addition including more than one exchange ('borrowing'). Next week, we will start to practise the column method of subtraction. As historians, the class were amazed to found out about all the different things the Romans brought to Britain for the first time: straight roads, central heating, our calendar for example. As scientists, the children learnt how to use thermometers to measure temperature. They investigated what happened to the temperature over time of three different containers of water (iced, tap and warm water). They discovered that the temperature of the iced water gradually increased, the tap water stayed more or less the same, and the warm water cooled down. They eventually all reached the same temperature. In our PE lessons, the children have been working in pairs to develop their gymnastic skills. As a reminder, our PE lessons are on Monday and Thursday afternoons so children should come to school in their PE kits on those days. The week finished with our trip to the Lunt Roman Fort. The children all really enjoyed the trip and learnt so much about life in the Roman army. We will include some photos of our trip in next week's newsletter. On Monday, we have our trip to the Belgrade Theatre to see the famous children's author Michael Rosen to look forward to. Well done, Year 4 – another super week. Year 5

Year 5 have had another great week of learning. In English, we have been looking at the features of a nonchronological explanation. First, we looked at some information books to spot the different features. Next, we looked at a specific text and highlighted the features. We discussed the idea that there could be life on other planets and gave our opinions about this. We watched a clip about the fictional planet, Pandora. Using the Pandorapedia website, we made notes about the creatures living on this imaginary planet. We also wrote an introduction to an explanation text using Pandora as our inspiration. In maths, we have been practising written methods of addition and subtraction of numbers with more than 4 digits. In addition, we have used both rounding and inverse operations to check for accuracy. The children have been enjoying reading Brightstorm by Vashti Hardy as a class and following this up with comprehension questions to further their understanding of the story. In geography, we have been learning about the positives and negatives of globalisation. We found out that many products are made from materials from different parts of the world and might be assembled hundreds of miles from where the raw materials came from. In PSHE, we have been discussing stereotypes and the impact they might have on people's feelings, behaviour and aspirations, as well as how to challenge them. In RE, we have been discussing why people go to church, ready for our trip to two different churches on Tuesday next week. Year 6

This week Year 6 have been hard at work drafting their persuasive letters in their English lessons. The children had previously been taught how to use modal verbs, apply features of persuasion such as rhetorical questions and how to use engaging sentence openers which helped them whilst penning their letters. I was so impressed by the variety of topics that were written. Some children requested that their parents buy them a new pet, others wanted a new games console and some were writing to the headteacher about changes they would like at lunch times. It was great to see a range of styles and formalities in what a very useful writing skill, applicable to real life situations.

As mathematicians, the children have been learning about factors, multiples, prime numbers and square and cubed numbers. They have solved a range of problems linked to these topics and were curious to learn that the number 2 is the only even prime number in our number system. Later in the week, the children began to explore formal written long multiplication and they impressed me with how they took care in laying out their calculations.

In R.E. the children were learning about what it means to embody beliefs across a range of cultures. They learnt that some Christians pray to God to build a 'relationship' with him. Some Hindus sing to Krishna to feel a deeper connection and some Jewish communities follow The Torah very closely. They learnt that an embodied belief is deeper than simply liking something and it is linked to how all humans view the world.

As readers and scientists, the children were learning about Charles Darwin. They found out that he had 3 degrees in vastly different subject areas and was eventually chosen to sail on The Beagle (much to his relief). This allowed him to follow his passion for exploring the idea of evolution. The children also learnt that he hid his findings and locked them away for many years for fear of upsetting the Christian community at that time. 
