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Celebrating our Learning Reception

We have enjoyed another amazing week of learning in Reception! This week the children continued their *Spring* theme by reading the story *Egg*. We found out about different animals that lay eggs and looked at where they lay them. There are so many amazing animals that lay eggs! Our discussions about eggs led onto the Easter story and why many people celebrate this time and why many people give and receive chocolate eggs. We enjoyed making Easter cards and created an Egg display in our classroom by creating our own Egg characters based on the book we had read. We have continued to practice our letter formation in our daily handwriting lessons, and the children have impressed us so much with the sentences they are beginning to write! In PE we have started our athletics topic and the children have been learning how to throw a javelin! In music, the children have been learning how to play the Glockenspiel with Mrs Smith, which they have shown so much enjoyment with. They have also shown lots of respect during their lessons which we are proud of.

At home, please continue with reading regularly with you child over the Easter break and log onto Bug Club too as this will have a huge impact on your child returning after a two-week break.

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Year 1

What an exciting week we've had in Year 1! In English, we were contacted by Supertato—a real blast from the past! He wrote to tell us that Evil Pea had escaped and was causing trouble once again. He asked us to keep our eyes peeled and report back on any mischief. When I arrived in the classroom on Monday morning, I discovered that Evil Pea had been very busy indeed: chairs were tipped over, a pencil pot had been spilled, books were thrown around the book corner, and counters were scattered everywhere! I took photos to show the children, and together we got to work using subjects and verbs to update Supertato on everything Evil Pea had done. After emailing our sentences, Supertato replied and asked the children to create wanted posters filled with adjectives to help him catch the naughty pea. He later wrote back to say thank you and let us know that, thanks to Year 1's hard work, Evil Pea had been safely captured again, so we can rest easy this half term! In Maths, we continued our learning on measurement. We began the week by measuring the length and height of different objects using cubes before moving on to measuring in centimetres. On Wednesday, we explored mass, comparing objects and using the language *heavier* and *lighter*. The children showed fantastic understanding, explaining confidently that an object's mass, not its size, determines how heavy or light it is. We also completed our D&T projects this week by painting our crockery. The children carefully followed their design plans, and the finished pieces look fantastic! We then evaluated our work by discussing what went well and what we might improve if we were to make them again. In RE, we rounded off our learning about angels by discovering a powerful angel called Metatron. We learned that Metatron is important to people with Christian worldviews and some people with Jewish worldviews, and that he always carries a pen to record the actions of people. We quickly noticed that this is very similar to the two scribes in Islam that we learned about last week, who also record a person's good and bad deeds. We then explored how people with non-religious worldviews might think about angels. We discussed how some people might see an "angel" as someone, real or imaginary, who guards them or guides them through life. We shared ideas, suggesting that an angel might be a friend, a family member, or even an imaginary figure who helps us feel safe and supported. Finally, we wanted to tell you all about our amazing trip to the Coventry Transport Museum last Friday. We had so much fun! We enjoyed two exciting workshops, where we learned all about the history of Josiah Turner and James and John Starley, and the evolution of bicycles. We got to role play the different characters, experience what it was like to sit on a penny farthing model and enjoy a variety of other creative activities. We also enjoyed ending the day with a walk around the museum, exploring all of the history! This trip was definitely one to remember. We have posted some lovely photos on our Twitter page so, if you haven't had a look already, check them out. 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Year 2

It has been a lovely and very busy final week of the spring term in Year 2. Firstly, it was lovely to meet with so many of you on Tuesday and Thursday afternoon at Parents Evening. In English, the children have been continuing looking at *John Patrick Norman McHennessy - The Boy who was Always Late*. During the week the children have been writing their recounts based on the story. Mrs Akthar and I were so impressed with the fantastic writing the children have produced. All their writing has improved so much over the last two terms and they are able to use a range of grammatical features in their writing that they have been taught. In Maths this week, the class have continued their learning on measurement. This week they have been introduced to measuring in both millilitres and litres. We spoke about how we need to look at the scale of the containers as it would help us see how much liquid is inside. On Thursday, the children had the opportunity to create their own fruit muffins. The children were able to practise a range of different skills when creating their muffins from chopping, slicing, mixing, pouring and grating. It was great to see enjoyment and the teamwork the children showed during the activity. After that, they got to eat their fruit muffins, which was their favourite part – yummy! Finally, we considered what they enjoyed most about their fruit muffin and also if they would do anything differently next time. In science this week, we explored the learning question: *What do sport stars do to keep healthy?* We discussed the different things that help us stay healthy, such as eating a balanced diet, exercising regularly and getting enough sleep. The children also thought about what they can do to keep themselves healthy in their own daily lives. We talked about why these healthy habits are important and what might happen if we do not look after our bodies, helping the children understand the importance of making good choices. This week in RE, we have been learning about special books. We began by sharing our own special books and discussing why they are important to us. We then explored the Bible and its importance to people with Christian worldviews. As part of our learning, we looked at the parable of the Lost Sheep and discussed what it teaches us about God. The children reflected on how God is like a good shepherd, showing care, love and forgiveness, and always looking after everyone, even when they feel lost. It really has been a wonderful Spring Term, and as it comes to a close Mrs Akthar, and I want to say well done to all the children on all of their hard work so far. They should all be proud of how much they have come along with their learning during the academic year so far. We hope you all have a wonderful Easter break, and we look forward to seeing you on the first day back! Have a lovely Easter holiday. Miss Softic and Mrs Akthar



Year 3

What a great half-term we have had in Year 3. During the last few weeks, we have become experts in recognising fractions, authors, actors, dancers, geographers exploring the polar regions and much, much more!

This week, we wrote our own versions of the story *Stone Age Boy* by Satoshi Kitamura. We enjoyed creating twists to the original story including how our characters ended up in the Stone Age and what adventures they went on. As mathematicians, we have been learning about mass namely measuring using kilograms and grams equivalent masses and comparing mass. Using scales, we were able to identify the mass of various objects in our classroom.

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Next term, we will continue our learning of capacity and volume, before moving on to fractions with a focus on adding & subtracting fractions and finding fractions of amounts. As scientists, we had a great afternoon learning about how we see things. We completed a sorting activity to learn about light sources and learned how we need a light source to see things.

Today, our trip to Compton Verney has given us the opportunity to experience life in the Stone Age. We have taken part in many hands-on activities including making a shelter, preparing a campfire, building with wattle and daub, creating cave paintings and making bread. What a great way to bring our learning of the prehistoric period to life! Well done, Year 3. Have a wonderful Easter break. Mrs Nagra and Miss Roberts



Year 4

Firstly, it was great to meet with so many of you on Tuesday and Thursday evening to discuss your child's progress at parents' evening. If you have further questions, please come and speak to Mrs Amphlett or me on the playground before or after school, or send an email to the school admin email address. At the end of the previous week and the start of this week, the children finished making their lamp shades for D&T week and finally, they evaluated their designs. In our English lessons, the children have been enjoying the wordless picture book – *Journey*. The children have been using their imaginations to plan and write their own 'Journey' inspired stories. The children have used: paragraphs; fronted adverbials to start their sentences; inverted commas for dialogue; and relative clauses in their writing. In our maths lessons, the children have continued their learning on decimal numbers. They have learnt how to divide 1- and 2-digit numbers by 10 and 100; they have placed hundredths on a place value chart; they have found out how to make a whole with tenths and hundredths; and they have learnt how to partition decimals. After the Easter break, we will be learning about decimals in the context of money so if the opportunity arises over the holidays, whilst you are out shopping, it would be good to discuss this with your child. As geographers, the children found out about the different types of settlements – hamlet, village, town, city. If you go anywhere over Easter, it would be a good opportunity to discuss these different settlement types as you drive through them. As scientists, the children considered what different electrical appliances we use and what life would be like without electricity. In PSHE, the children talked about peer pressure; in RE, the class learnt about non-religious views about God; and in computing, the children used data-loggers to measure and record results. On Thursday, the children had their last swimming lesson at the Xcel centre. The children have really enjoyed these sessions and they have all improved their swimming and confidence in the water. After the Easter break, our PE days will switch to a **Monday** and a **Friday** so please can children come to school in their PE kit on these days. No specific home learning has been set for the holidays but please still encourage your child to read regularly and to practise their times tables on TTrackstars. 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Year 5

What a great term we have had in Year 5! We've done so much learning over the weeks. In our final week, we continued our perimeter and area unit in maths, finding the areas of compound shapes and irregular shapes. Having gathered lots of information about the pros and cons of HS2, we spent our English lessons this week writing our own newspaper articles and have written them up in the style of a newspaper. Because we are the class with the highest attendance in the school this term, we got to have golden time with Mrs Smith! We got to play lots of games and had some sweet treats too. In RE, we watched a video of the Easter story and made our own comic strip versions of the story. In science, we learnt about how plants reproduce and thought about whether plants need seeds to reproduce. We found that some plants are pollinated by the wind, while others are pollinated by insects. Not all plants have seeds, some reproduce in different ways like having runners, tubers, bulbs or having cuttings taken. In our computing lessons, we have been writing programmes for the Turtle Stitch sewing machine. Our codes told the sewing machine how to create our designs. They look absolutely amazing! In history this week, we were finding out about why the ancient Egyptians mummified their pharaohs. We even mummified a few of the children! We had to follow the instructions carefully. Next, we wrote our own set of instructions. To conclude our history unit, the children researched Tutankhamun and completed a Google slide all about him. We also thought you would like to see some of the Egyptian make up cases we made last week. The children have worked very hard over the Spring Term and we are very proud of them all. 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Year 6

As writers this week, the children were putting the finishing touches to their very own spring roll recipes. Using their experiences from the week prior, the class wrote down their ingredient list and method with great care and even considered the target audience for their recipe. It was enjoyable to read them and it was wonderful to see so much variety within their work.

As mathematicians, the children have been getting to grips with understanding how to find the area and perimeter of triangles. The children learnt that to find the area of a triangle you can multiply the base by the height and then halve your answer. They also discovered that triangles without a right angle can pose a problem in this regard so they learnt to identify the perpendicular height as a solution. Later in the week, the children explored parallelograms and then began exploring volume with cubes. The children learnt that length multiplied by width and then height helps find the volume of any cube or cuboid. Great maths work, everyone.

Within PSHE, the children were learning about prejudice and discrimination. The children discussed some of the areas in society where this has taken place and learnt about protected characteristics which are bound by British law. Later, they also discussed stereotypes and how to navigate these thoughts if or when they occur. It was an informative session where the children showed maturity and respect to everyone.


As geographers, the children were exploring the consequences of droughts including damage to ecosystems, crops and shortages of drinking water. They discovered that a drought is an extended period of unusually dry weather and that these effects can slowly develop over time. The children also learnt that droughts could occur when typical weather patterns change and because of this, droughts can sometimes last for months or even years.

It is difficult to believe that we are already on the cusp of the summer term. What a fantastic term of learning this has been. I hope you all have a fantastic Easter break and feel refreshed and ready for our final term together when we return. Mr. '
